- A level results are extremely positive:
- •8 A* achieved- 38.1 % of the students
- •8 A achieved-38.1 % of the students
- •4 B achieved- 14.3 % of the students

Choosing a language is not the easy option

- reputation for being harder than other ALs nationally this is true. But at Latymer, French performs slightly better than average of departments
- What does it say about you? Well-rounded, hardworking, looking for a challenge, resilient and willing to take risks
- Makes you stand out MFL highly regarded by employers & unis skills of oracy, problem solving, confidence and quick thinking.
- However at Latymer we get excellent results good proportion of A*, and most students get A, with the occasional B.

Why study French?

- Become fluent in the language, and gain an excellent understanding of social, cultural and political issues in the francophone world.
- Multidisciplinary: language but also history / society / geography / politics / economics / film / literature / music.
- Employability flexibility & rigour = very marketable skillset
- Varied and creative work
- Gain confidence in understanding and talking about the world
- Fun trips & extracurricular
- Smaller groups different rapport with classmates & staff.

Where do Languages take you?

- Jobs law, business, finance, education, banking, journalism, diplomacy, creative, translation, economics, engineering, medicine etc
- High numbers go on to degree including element of French at uni (about 50%)

Structure of course:

- Topics in year 1 (or AS):
 - Famille/ Cyber / Cinéma / Musique / Patrimoine / Bénévolat
 - The film 'La Haine'
- Topics in year 2
 - Société diverse / Les marginalisés / Les criminels / Politique & jeunes / Politique et Immigration / Grèves et Manifestations.

Step up from GCSE

- Yes, but less than previous years (new GCSE) it takes more work, but you have more time to specialise, and the work is engaging.
- Grammar (most tenses covered subjunctive, reported speech, passives, tricky pronouns, inversions etc)

Exams

- Paper 1 listening, reading and writing
- Paper 2 translation and writing about film / literature
- Paper 3 oral exam
 - AS: choose 2 of 4 cards (6 topics)
 - A Level: choose 1 of 2 cards (12topics) & IRP
 - Examples of IRP

Staffing

• 15 periods per fortnight: 2 class teachers + French assistant sessions (20 minutes each week)

Why study French at LATYMER?

- Excellent staffing. Stable department. Mix of native / non-native, male and female, and different experiences. All have lived, worked and studied in France.
- 20 mins weekly one-to-one oral classes.
- Teaching is interactive and varied lots of speaking from first lesson: building confidence.
- Friendly and inclusive department.
- Resources library stocked with books, BD, DVDs. Online subscriptions and etextbooks.
- Extra-curricular Toulouse / Debating / Drama / Enrichment / Essay & translation comps.
- Opportunity for residential exchange = 1 week of immersion early on in the course (not many schools offer this in 6th form, study weekend in Paris)
- Opportunity to be 6th form mentors (UCAS!)
- Mixed school! Work with clever, motivated, open-minded and friendly students.

FAQs:

- Grade requirement? 6 x Grade 7s at GCSE including French. Ideally grade 8.
- No entrance test unless doing maths / science
- AS? Only if students don't want to complete the AL Internal exams at end of year 12
- Class size? Between 10 and 18 per class.
- Step up from GCSE yes: support package sent out in the supper term to help revise basics from GCSE course.
- Textbook? Online teachers and students have access to a wide range of up-to-date resources, using video, web and music.
- Trip to Toulouse: We are hoping that our trip to Toulouse will be back after the pandemic!






